
NSW Championships

A contingent of Melbourne Forest racers travelled to central NSW on the first weekend in September for the the combined middle and long distance NSW champs.

The terrain was excellent - albeit a bit too green on the Saturday - combining good granite features with forest ranging from thick to open. Blair and Rune put in solid performances both days coming 5th and 7th in the Middle distance, blair some 4 minutes behind winner Eric Morris who completed the 7 km course in 43 minutes. Dion finished in 58 minutes. Jasmine lead the womens race on the Saturday until a 2 minute mistake on the 6th control cost her the lead; she finished in 5th place (17 seconds behind her sister Mace) and then in 4th place on Sunday. Mace had a day to forget on Sunday, picking up the wrong map at the start and losing 9 minutes to the first control!

Blair and Rune came 5th and 6th respectively in Sunday's race with Eric winnning again. Dion got our club's only podium spot, coming third in the sledge. Our theme song for the weekend - snappy crocodile - kept us going on the long haul back down the Hume Highway. **Dion Keech**

Australian Champs preview by Blair Trewin



The Australian Championships will take place in Tasmania this year. The championship events will take place on the Littlechild Creek map near St. Helens.

In its initial incarnation, for the 1988 Asia-Pacific Championships, this was as enjoyable an area as you'll find anywhere – lots of rock detail, runnable and not excessively steep. It got thicker in the four years after that (in 1988 it had been burnt in the not-too-distant past), and the relatively short courses (13.2km for M21E) suggest that it might have got thicker still, making it a physical challenge.

Features of the area that aren't common in Victoria are the marshes and the scrubby creeks. There are a number of large open marshes on the map. They look inviting, but are not particularly fast to cross. They are useful for navigation and to run along the edges. (As an aside, the tannin from the marshes also gives St. Helens tap water a distinct brown colour). Many of the creeks have narrow bands of thick vegetation along them, and picking gaps is potentially going to be very important to route choice. Unlike Victoria, you can probably push through a few metres of dark green if you really want to, but it's not something I'd recommend unless desperate....

On to the likely results:

M21E:The big question mark here will be how many of the WOC team members will run, and how seriously they will take it.Three are in the country (Grant Bluett, Troy de Haas and Dave Shepherd), although Troy's intentions are unclear and Dave is under an injury cloud.The absence of an Australian title is a clear hole in Grant's CV, and one he will be looking to address now that he's retired from international competition. He will probably go in as favourite whoever runs, and as a clear favourite if Troy is missing.

With Tom Quayle also still injured, the contest for 'best of the rest' is probably between Eric Morris and Rob Preston. Rob had an excellent early season and wasn't that far away from the team; Eric struggled early on and missed the WOC trials through illness, but two good wins in the NSW Championships suggested he is getting back to good form.

Form amongst the rest will become clearer over the next couple of weeks; this is a group that will probably need the big guns to make mistakes to get in the placings, but should all be there or thereabouts. Bruce Arthur is in career-best running form and had an excellent win against a decent field at Kooyoora, Blair Trewin has had an injury-free winter for the first time in several years, the Rattray brothers both ran well in NSW, and Rune Olsen will also be a contender if he can put a race together on the day.


W21E: It looks like three of the WOC team will be running

here: Hanny Allston, Jo Allison and Tracy Bluett (Natasha Key will be missing). These three all had some very good days at the World Championships – exceptional in Hanny's case – and it is hard to go past them for the placings. Hanny has been untouchable at long distance from the WOC trials onward and probably goes in as the leading contender: granite hasn't always been her favourite terrain but she showed at Seldom Seen last year that she can now handle it as well as most. Tracy has had some minor injury disruptions in the lead-up but that shouldn't be too much of a barrier.

No-one else in the field has been able to match those three with any sort of consistency in 2005. Clare Hawthorne surprised us all at the same event last year, and is probably the one other person in the field whose good days are capable of going close to matching the good days of the WOC team members. Danielle Winslow, who was in the 2004 WOC team but had a disappointing first half of 2005, suggested at the NSW Championships that she was getting back into reasonable form, whilst Nicki Taws can never be counted out and Grace Elson is also a reasonable top-five chance.

AJ takes bronze




